Hope to see you all in Gettysburg!




Mark Dunkelman Our Featured Speaker for the 2021 Reunion

The unique approach Mark H. Dunkelman has taken to the study of Civil War history dates from his childhood, when his father and aunt passed along stories and relics of their grandfather, with whom they had grown up on a farm in Western New York.

Those tales and mementoes of Corporal John Langhans of the 154th New York Volunteer Infantry gripped Mark with a passion to learn more about his great-grandfather's regiment that has never abated.

During a lifetime of study, he has had the good fortune to connect with more than 1300 descendants of members of the 154th New York. Since 1986 he has organized annual reunions of descendants in Cattaraugus and Chautauqua counties, where the regiment was raised.

In 1988, an 80 foot long mural Mark designed and painted with artist Johan Bjurman was installed at Coster Avenue in Gettysburg, site of the 154th's fight on July 1, 1863. In 1996 Mark led the regimental descendants to raise funds to erect a monument to their ancestors at Chancellorsville, VA, the 154th's bloodiest battlefield. In five decades of work, Mark has located and copied more than 1,700 wartime letters, 27 diaries, portraits of 281 members of the regiment, and a great mass of other material. Those sources served as the basis for six well-received books and dozens of articles he has written on various aspects of the 154th's history. Twenty-six letters written by brothers Ephraim H. and Arthur Hotchkiss are in Mark's personal collection. Those letters, augmented by other sources, have enabled Mark to piece together the story of the brothers' lives, and their experiences in the Civil War, which he will share with the Hotchkiss Family Association at the 2021 reunion.

Once each name is entered, research begins to fill out a family sketch; census information (1790-1940), birth, death, and marriage information, etc. It is a long term project! Clarence Merow, husband of Emma Merow for 75 years passed away August 25, 2020. He was the son of Edward A. Merow and Emma Dorothy Goldberg. They were parents of Dale (Lorraine) Merow of Coraopolis, PA and Darlene Fleming of Waterdown, Ontario, Canada.

Emma J. Merow was born in Endicott on April 15, 1925. She and Clarence resided in Cassadaga for 65 years before moving to Fredonia Place Assisted Living in 2018.

She was employed by a number of companies, retiring from Bigelow's Department Store in Jamestown. She played bridge, took tole painting courses and became an accomplished artist. As an avid quilter and seamstress she created a beautiful legacy for the family because God gifted her with a vision of what each grandchild and great-grandchild would appreciate. These treasures will live on in their homes for years to come.

She & Clarence were members of the Pleasant Valley United Methodist Church for the past 20 years.

Kenneth Weber Hotchkiss 1923-2015 111-192-344
Hotchkiss Colorado resident, Kenneth W. Hotchkiss passed away at his home on February, 2015. He was 91.

He was born Nov 16, 1923 to Clifford and Vienna (Weber) Hotchkiss in Agnew, Nebraska. He spent his childhood in Raymond, NE. After graduation he went to the Univ. of Nebraska for 3 years, then to Oklahoma A & M University where he received his Bachelor's degree in Agricultural Engineering in 1948.

He enlisted in the U.S. Navy before he graduated and served as a Naval Air Navigator based in the Pacific theater.

He married the love of his life, Joy Russell in Mountain View, OK on May 30, 1948. They were married for 66 years.

Kenneth was an entrepreneur and started several small business over his lifetime. From drainage engineering in Minnesota to irrigation design in Colorado and plastic injection molding, he held patents in irrigation, telecommunication and medical devices.

He was a school board member, Boy Scout leader and in 1963 became the leader of 45 Peace Corps volunteer engineers and took his young family to Dacca, East Pakistan (now Bangladesh) for two years.

In 1999, they moved to Hotchkiss from Golden. A member of the Mountain View Bible Church in Lazear, CO, he also was a member of the Black Canyon VFW and the Kiwanis Club.

Surviving is his wife, Joy of Hotchkiss; daughter Deborah (Paul) Stumme, of Crawford; sons: Robert (Stephanie) Hotchkiss of Riverside, CT and Mark (Karen) Hotchkiss of Boulder; eight grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Notes from Past Reunions

Hotchkiss Family Reunion Held In Prospect August 19, 1897

*From the Morning Journal and Courier, New Haven, CT, August 21, 1897, page 4. **Ninety Representatives of Gideon Hotchkiss' Descendants Present.***

Over ninety people were present, representing thirty-six families from fifteen towns and two states, all being descendants of Stephen, the father of Captain Gideon Hotchkiss who was one of the early settlers of what is now known as Prospect...After dinner addresses were made by George H Cowell, B.S. Hotchkiss, D.B. Hotchkiss and others, and recitations by Luelle and Minnie Hotchkiss... George H Cowell spoke of the part borne by the colony of Connecticut in the early history of the nation, in the Revolutionary war and in the founding of the republic and its principles; though small in area, wealth and population, furnished more than her quota of men, money and means to carry on the war; that the men were second to none in field of council; that we might

well be proud of our ancestors, their courage, sagacity and sterling worth... All present agreed that the day, the place and the occasion were "just right." The fine old maples, the lovely scenery, the bracing air, were not to be surpassed anywhere. *From Genealogybank.com*

The 35th annual reunion of the Hotchkiss Family association was held at Lake Compounce, Aug. 25th, with an attendance of about 150. Dinner was served at 12:30, and the business meeting was called to order at 1:45 by the president, Emerson Hotchkiss, of Kensington. It was voted to hold the next meeting at Lake Compounce on the Wednesday before the last Thursday of August, 1916.

The election of officers resulted as follows: President, Emerson Hotchkiss of Kensington; vice president, Seymour Hotchkiss, Wallingford; secretary, Mabel Hotchkiss, Prospect; treasurer, Charles T. Hotchkiss, West Cheshire; table committee, Charles Fenn, Prospect; Rollin Bird, Waterbury; Robert Hotchkiss, Waterbury; Mrs. Hattie Pardee, Cheshire; Mrs. Frank Sloper, West Cheshire. Social committee, Mrs. Fred A. Sanford, Westfield, Mass.; Mrs. Seymour Hotchkiss, Wallingford.

After the business meeting, an interesting program was given and enjoyed by all. A paper on "The American Flag," by Mrs. Seymour Hotchkiss, was followed by the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner," by Miss Emma Strong, the audience joining in the chorus. More Sites to See After the Reunion

A few additional ideas for making the trip into a memorable vacation could include: Independence Hall and the Liberty Bell in nearby Philadelphia, about 2 1/2 hours away. The new **Museum of the American Revolution** there is getting rave reviews. Here are a couple of examples of what you can see there. Climb aboard a 45-foot replica ship and experience the war at sea through the story of James Forten a 14 year-old free African American, who later became a prominent abolitionist and Philadelphia businessman.

See one of the most iconic surviving artifacts of the Revolution, General George Washington's War Tent, called the "rock star of the collection" by the New York Times.

Chart the action of the War on an interactive map that highlights the encampments, advances, and encounters of the American army and the British and Hessian army at the Battles of Trenton and Princeton and lots more, check it out at here...
